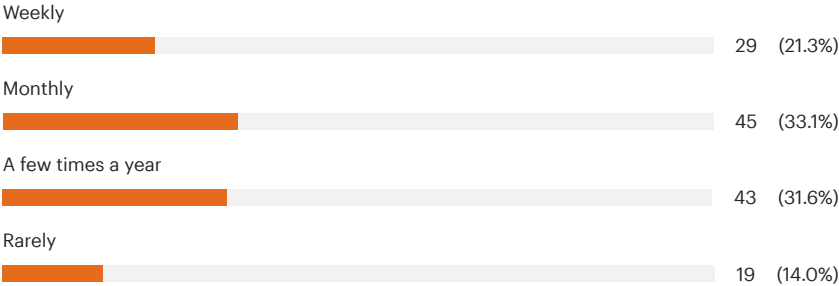

Question 2 has 136 answers (Radio buttons)

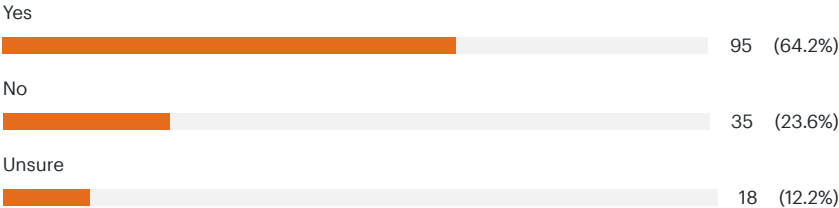
"If yes, how often do you visit the library?"

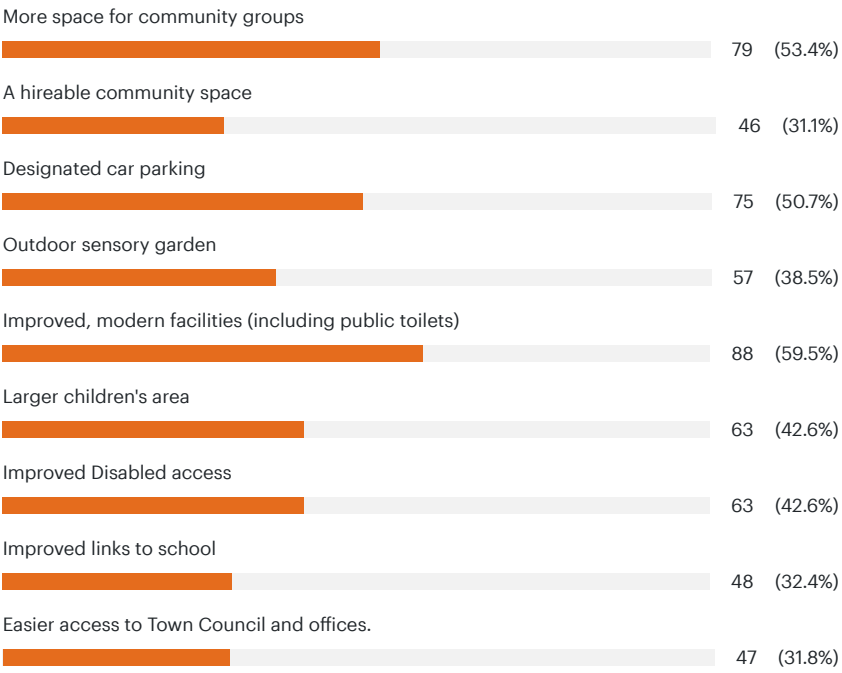
"Do you support the idea of relocating the library and council offices to a new, modern facility?"

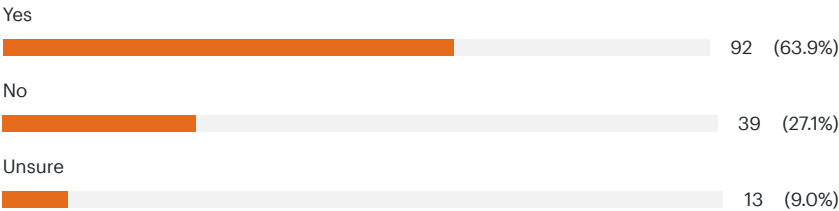
